
In February Bacchus Marsh Rotary Club joined Dr Rav

A soiree was held at 'Benwerrin' Holts Lane with hosts Helen and Peter Shilton on St Patrick's Day. Fifty guests attended; food was provided by Neale's Spit Roast Catering, and music was provided by the "Baccbeat Jazz Band", with the usual suspects plus Keith Hoffman on keyboards and Joel Cabrie on bass. We were very lucky with the weather – no wind and reasonably warm.

The evening wasn't intended to be a fundraiser but takings exceeded costs by about \$200, so the evening was successful at every level. In the past soirees have been catered for by Rotarians but this year we decided to keep it simple by using outside caterers. I didn't hear a single complaint about the food, and it is certainly much easier to have it delivered, on time, hot and ready to serve. This could be a model for future years. 2023 Art Show

Our 51st Art Exhibition and Sale was held over the King's Birthday weekend and proved to be successful in every respect. The return of the traditional Gala Opening was enthusiastically welcomed by local residents and several visitors from further afield.



Our judge for 2023 was Sophie Prince, Curator with the Australian and First Nations Art Curatorial Team at the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV) and we were delighted that she was able to attend the prize presentation and meet with many of the successful artists to discuss their work.

Sales achieved our second highest ever result in terms of numbers (111) and percentage (21.7%) of artworks sold, but importantly, it was clear that this is still a much-anticipated cultural event widely appreciated by local and interstate artists and visitors from all over Victoria. The committee was pleased to welcome many new artists to the show this year and so continue to provide an exhibition that is always fresh and sometimes challenging. Visitor numbers almost equalled those of most years and compliments upon, and letters of appreciation of, the organisation and presentation of the show were received from both visitors and participating artists.

The 2023 committee was headed by Ian Cabrie and Davina Cabrie as Co-Chair and Secretary. Russell Gilbert was our able Treasurer, Phil McBean our sponsorship guru, Melanie Currie, Peter Shilton and Alan Morton, our catering and beverage coordinators, Alan Morton also our promotional board organiser and Ian Cabrie, Russell Dodemaide, Peter Shilton, Bob Levy, Kyan Cabrie, Campbell Fethers, Peter Lawford, Lindsay Arnold and John Lucas our incredibly hardworking organisers of hall set-up, take-down and large painting hanging. Packing up and cleaning tasks were cheerfully performed by the whole club team.

As always, a myriad other labour-intensive tasks were performed by the committee over the many months prior to the show and the weeks immediately before and after the event. The popularity and success of Peter and Helen Shilton's Barista Café Bar reached new heights and is a testament to their tireless work and effort. Visitors extolled the warm ambience of the "coffee corner", a space where visitors can relax, ponder their artwork favourites and catch up with friends.



Our judge, Sophie Prince, was impressed by the quality of the show and spent five hours in deliberation over her selection of prizewinners.

She was particularly fascinated by the imaginative and innovative approaches to traditional subjects, particularly in terms of the stories told by the artwork.

Janice Webster was our popular

Artist in Residence this year. She was celebrating 40 years of art in Bacchus Marsh, as both artist and teacher.



Visitors were intrigued by her amazing ability to rapidly create high-quality work in watercolour and clustered around to observe and ask questions.

The Children's Quiz, the brainchild of Friend of Rotary, Campbell Fethers, achieved an all-time success, with about 70 children, paper and pen in hand, closely examining each artwork to discover the answers to yet another set of ingenious questions. Parents inevitably became involved and came to appreciate many details of the artwork that they might otherwise have missed.

At the Gala Opening night 199 guests enjoyed the artwork, wine, beer and delicious finger food, all to the lively jazz music provided by our enthusiastic musical group, "The

BaccBeat Jazz Band". Group members were Peter Shilton on saxophone, Ian Cabrié on drums, Keith Currie on bass guitar, Keith Hoffman on piano and Chris Levy as singer.

Members of the CPNS group, ably headed by Norma Trotter prepared and served the food with the assistance of 11 Bacchus Marsh Grammar Hospitality students as wait staff.

The Rotary four-way test

Of the things we think, say or do ...

- Is it the *Truth*?
- o Is it *Fair* to all concerned?
- Will it build *Goodwill* and *Better Friendships*?
- Will it be *Beneficial* to all concerned?

In 1932, <u>Herbert J. Taylor</u> set out to save the Club Aluminum Products distribution company from bankruptcy. His recovery plan started with changing the ethical climate of the company. He explained: The first job was to set policies for the company that would reflect the high ethics and morals God would want in any business. If the people who worked for Club Aluminum were to think right, He knew they would do right.

What was needed was a simple, easily remembered guide to right conduct - a sort of ethical yardstick- which all of us in the company could memorize and apply to what we thought, said and did. He searched through many books for the answer to his need, but the right phrases eluded him.

Eventually, he wrote down the twenty-four words that changed the history and became synonyms for Rotary evolution.

- 1. Is it the truth?
- 2. Is it fair to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build goodwill and better friendships?
- 4. Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

It is called "The Four-Way Test of the things we think, say or do."

Eloquently simple, stunning in its power, undeniable in its results, The Four-Way Test offers a fresh and positive vision in the midst of a world full of tension, confusion and uncertainty.

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Object of Rotary

The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- I. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- II. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to service society;
- III. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life;
- IV. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

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The plaque, imbedded in a large stone at the left of the entrance reads:

The Centenary of Federation plaque was jointly unveiled on Saturday 5th May 2001 by the Federal Member for Burke, the Hon. Neil O'Keefe M.H.R. and the State Member for Gisborne, Joanne Duncan MLA in the presence of the Mayor, Shire of Moorabool, Cr. Margaret Card and the President, Rotary Club of Bacchus Marsh, Mr Ian Morris.



To celebrate the Centenary of Federation the Rotary Club of Bacchus Marsh applied for and received a grant to plant trees along Gisborne Road, to be known as Federation Avenue. Red flowering gums, native to Western Australia, were chosen, and to accelerate their growth, they were grafted onto red spotted gums. In conjunction with the Work for the Dole Scheme, Rotarian Byron Guthrie arranged and assisted in the preparation of the planting beds. Former Rotarian, Frank Ruffo formed the mounds and provided valuable assistance in preparing the various garden beds that were an adjunct to the avenue of trees.

Over 500 people attended the dedication of the Avenue, including local member Joanne Duncan MP. On a prearranged signal, namely the sounding of a siren on a local CFA truck, citizen of Bacchus Marsh planted 162 red flowering gums. The Rotary Club of Bacchus Marsh has continued to maintain the Avenue, and has replaced many trees destroyed by vandalism or the drought.
